## PARISH COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Nomination Papers are now available for the Parish Council Elections on May 3<sup>rd</sup> 2007 and I hope that after last month's article some parishioners are thinking about the possibility of standing for election. To help you make up your mind here is some further information about what would be involved:

The Parish Council meets on the second Monday of each month at 7.00pm and sometimes in between

regular meetings to consider planning applications.

The meetings start with a public forum when any parishioner can bring forward any concern they have involving the Parish and then the councillors work through the agenda which takes approximately two hours.

### WHO CAN BECOME A PARISH COUNCILLOR?

Anyone over 18 years old who is on the electoral roll, who lives in the Parish or within 3 miles of the parish, is eligible; as is anyone who has a business or works in the Parish.

You do not have to have lived here for a long time or have any specialist knowledge, just an interest in the continued well being of the town and surrounding area.

You need two people who are also on the Electoral Roll to sign your Nomination Paper, one to propose you and one to second the nomination.

# Angela's Garden Corner

## Your Garden in April

Often wet, nevertheless in April the Spring is definitely here. Make the most of the sunny days and have fun at Easter!

### LAWNS

Continue to raise the height of your lawnmower blade until the usual height is reached. A lawn left slightly longer will cope better with later drought, so consider whether you might want to do this. Lawns make a lot of work and this month you will need to rake out dead grass, usually called thatch, aerate any compressed areas and apply a spring tonic.

### BEDS AND BORDERS

Snowdrops can be dug up and split now, if they have become congested. Dead head other spring bulbs and give them a feed to help build them up for next year's display.

This is the best month to plant summer-flowering bulbs. In addition to the old favourites like gladioli, there are many other types like agapanthus, nerines, schizostylis and lilies. Plant them in groups anywhere there is a gap in your planting.

Prune any shrubs that have just finished flowering and also shrubs like buddleia and lavatera which make long canes during the spring and early summer.

If the winter has been wet like this year, you may find this a better month for sowing annuals than March. Don't worry about this because the plants will germinate more quickly and grow faster. By June they will have caught up with earlier sown seeds.



Old-fashioned annuals like larkspur, love-in-a-mist, cornflowers and poppies are easy to grow and ideal for giving a 'cottage-garden' effect, but they can also be grown in a

much more modern way. They can be sown in between annual grasses such as the Hare's Tail Grass or *hordeum*, to give an informal meadow effect, or

in solid blocks of one variety for greater formality, perhaps in a topiary or knot garden. Don't forget the annual climbers which can cover an eyesore in a season, or cover an arch or pergola. (See this month's feature on annual climbers).

### VEGETABLES AND FRUIT

Sowing is the main work this month. Sow your seeds according to the packet instructions, cover with fine soil and mark the row. Water the seed in. See last month's article on stale seed beds for the best results.

If you are starting to grow vegetables from scratch, this may be the first chance you have had to prepare the soil as the winter has been so wet. Don't despair, there is still time to dig and weed and rake the soil level. Pace yourself when working hard, take breaks and don't strain your back. Seeds planted now will catch up with the earlier sowings.

Don't prune grapevines from now on as the sap is rising. Cuts into the main framework now may cause the vine to bleed sap and die.

Harvest forced rhubarb. If frost threatens while fruit trees are in flower throw a sheet of fleece over them to protect the blossom.

### POTS AND PATIOS

This is the first time the patio will be in use after the winter so check the paving isn't slippery. A power washer is useful or a stiff broom can be used to clean it. If you use teak oil on your wooden garden furniture, now is the time to use it, otherwise give it a good clean and let it dry in the sunshine.

### SIX GREAT CLIMBERS TO GROW FROM SEED

*Sweet Pea* is the queen of annual climbers and ideally suited to our climate. Buy them now as seedlings in a pot or grow them yourself.

Glorious scent from the old varieties. Ideal for cut flowers.

*The Cup and Saucer Vine* or *cobaea scandens* is less well-known. Sow the seed now to produce an enormous climber covered with purple or greeny-white cup shaped flowers. Ideal for covering an eyesore.

*Black-eyed Susan* or *Thunberg* is a much smaller, neater climber and some varieties can be grown in a basket. Orange, red or white flowers all with a black, central eye. Good for limited space or a balcony.



### Morning Glory

or *ipomoea* is less grown in this country than in France or Italy.

Exquisite sky

blue trumpet flowers cover the plant making it probably the most beautiful annual climber, but it needs a lot of sunshine and warmth. Good for a conservatory or the sunniest spot in a sheltered garden.

*Nasturtium* is familiar to everyone, and very easy to grow which makes it ideal for children to sow themselves. It will climb or scramble over the ground and both the orange or red flowers, and the round leaves, are edible.



### French Climbing Bean

Like the more familiar Runner Bean, this is a climber and it

comes in many varieties with coloured flowers and pods, making it suitable for the decorative part of the garden as well as the vegetable plot. Very easy to grow.

### MODBURY MILLENNIUM MEADOW

Many of you will have heard about the Millennium Garden but sadly it goes almost unnoticed by the residents of Modbury due

to the poor access. For those of you unfamiliar with its location, it is the parcel of land that straddles the stream on the south side of Ayleston Park and was donated to the town, for its use, by the Rodgers family. Until now it has been referred to as a garden but since it is more accurately a meadow area, the Parish Council recently approved a change of name. Please go and have a look at Modbury Millennium Meadow.

Following the very successful work party in early December that cleared much of the undergrowth, volunteers have continued their efforts, cutting back some of the grass and laying the hedges on the north side. As a result, the daffodils planted several years ago are flourishing and some of the early wild flowers are also blooming. In clearing the hedges however, it has revealed that some of the stone work in the Devon

bank has disappeared and needs replacing. While the stone is fairly easy to replace, finding someone with the requisite skills to rebuild parts of the bank is slightly harder. We are looking, therefore, both for a source of suitable stone and someone willing to pass on their skills to assist with rebuilding the Devon hedge.

The next improvement is to provide access to the Meadow from the bottom of the town. By installing a new bridge over the stream behind the Tuckers Brook development, it will be possible to enter the Millennium Meadow via Burns Lane (by the Co-op) and the alleyway behind Tuckers Brook. Additionally, it is planned to construct a pathway to connect the new bridge to the existing bridge by Ayleston Park, making a pleasant and flat walkway for residents both young and elderly. A number of benches will be positioned both by the walkway and in selected areas within the Meadow.

The planning and financing of the project are in an advanced stage and you should expect to see work start on the bridge by early summer (according to South Hams DC). Any offers of help will be gratefully received by any Committee Member.

## WHAT DOES THE PARISH COUNCIL DISCUSS?

The council is consulted by the District Council for recommendations on local planning applications and its opinions are sought by various authorities - Highways, Police and Devon County Council on proposals with a direct impact on Modbury.

Individual Councillors represent the Council on other bodies within the Parish, including the Memorial Hall, MARS, Parish Charities, Parish Paths and the Millennium Meadow. They also attend meetings in the surrounding area and at the District Council on behalf of the council and report back to the Parish Council.

Councillors bring to the meetings any matter reported to them by Parishioners and their own observations of any area that needs attention or upgrading - for example fly tipping, damaged road signs, vandalism, uneven paving stones etc.

This is only a rough guide of the regulations and responsibilities and further information can be supplied by the Parish Clerk or Electoral Services at South Hams District Council - Tel 01803 861234

## BI-CENTENARY OF MODBURY BELLS

On Sunday 15th April at St George's Church, Modbury, the bell ringers and congregation will be celebrating 200 years of proud history of the six bells, reputed to be one of the finest six bell rings in Devon. In 1806 the old set of five bells, being rendered almost useless, some being cracked, it was agreed to have a peal of six bells, and Thomas Bilbie of Cullompton was fixed on as the bell founder. He used the metal of the old five bells with the addition of 1179 lb of bell metal at a cost of 180d per lb, to make up the six bells. The five bells had been cast by Thomas Pennington in 1621. He also had used the metal of the existing four bells, but of the origin of these four nothing is known. Perhaps they were as old as the tower itself, which was built in about 1350. So some of the metal in our six bells could have been ringing out over Modbury for over 600 years!

The new bells were first rung in Modbury on April 15th 1807 by ringers from Aveton Gifford and Plymouth and afterwards they sat down to a handsome dinner provided by the Exeter Inn. Unlike the present day, perhaps there were not many competent ringers in Modbury to ring that first peal.

There will be much parochial pride when we ring out on Sunday April 15th and we hope that when you hear the bells on that day, you will stop and listen and feel some of that pride as well!

The re-dedication service will be held at 10:30 am and it would be lovely to see a full church.


many illustrations, which included our local tollhouse at Stolliford, the only one left in the parish.




